Parameters: Defines how the output is created. These are some common parameters:

Parameter	Function	Range	Comments
--q	Quality	.25 - 5	Default is "1". Lower values yield less detail; higher more detail. Lower values render quickly; higher values are slower.
--seed	Seed	0-4294967295	The "seed" determines the starting point for creating images. Changing the seed changes the image. Keeping the seed the same will reproduce the same image.
--c	Chaos	0 – 100	Default is "0". High chaos values will produce unusual and unexpected results; lower values are more reliable/repeatable.
::w	Weight	0.5 – 2	Default is "1". Allows you to emphasize (or de-emphasize) certain parts of prompts. e.g., "plastic cow" vs "plastic::2 cow::1" – the second prompt emphasizes "plastic" twice as much as "cow". You can also "weight" segments with brackets, e.g., "a [human like robot]::2 with a [white wolf]::3 in the background"
--ar	Aspect ratio	any	Default is "1:1". Any aspect ratio can be used, e.g., --ar 4:3, --ar 16:9, --17:4. etc.
--stylize	Style	0 – 1000	Default is "100". Makes an image more or less stylized.
--tile	Tile		Generates images that can be used as repeating tiles
--style	Niji 5 Style		Try --style cute, --style scenic, --style original , or --style expressive
--iw	image weight	0 – 2	Default is "1". Change how varied the results will be. Higher values produce more unusual and unexpected generations.
--no	negative		Specify what to exclude – e.g., "landscape photo --no clouds mountains" for a landscape image without mountains or clouds
--style raw	raw mode		Results will be created using a more literal interpretation of the prompt and less "inspiration". (can also be enabled from /Settings)
--wierd	weird mode	0 - 3000	Default is 0. This command makes your images look more weird / edgy.

Hints for good prompts:

- More than about 40 words are ignored by Midjourney.
- Shorter prompts increase your chances of getting the image you want.
- The first 5 words are the most important.
- The first subject mentioned often appears in the image's center.
- Prepositions ("in," "at," "on," "of," and "to") are ignored.
- Try writing a prompt and then have ChatGPT "condense" the phrase. (e.g., "Condense the following phrase: [put in your phrase].")
- Don't use redundant words (e.g., don't use: "a man swimming, swimming, man")
- Start off with the type of image you want. e.g., "a photo of..." or "a line drawing of...", etc.
- Stick to the main ideas you want to see in your image and make each word count.
- The bot doesn't understand grammar or sentence structure.
- Focus on what you want in the image. If there's something you don't want, use the "--no" parameter for a better chance of keeping something unwanted out.
- Think about the subject, medium, environment, lighting, color, mood, and composition when prompting the bot.
- Everything in your prompt has a default weight of 1. You can add weight or use negative weights. For example "cat::2" would give it a weight of 2.
- Check your settings (/settings)! Make sure you're using version 5 for the most realistic-looking images.
- Use the RAW mode (in settings) to render less "opinionated" images.
- Upload a photo and use the /define feature to get prompt inspiration.
- Experiment with cameras, film types, angles, perspectives, lenses and apertures for a different look/feel to your image.
- Be sure to specify what kind of lighting you want.
- If you don't get what you want the first time, try regenerating the images.

To keep the consistency of an uploaded photo, try using a strong image weight (::2) for the image URL (e.g., <https://s.mj.run/12345::2> futuristic) and/or use this phrase in the prompt: **keep the consistency of action, expression, clothing, shape and appearance of the photo**
